The Department's Revised Enrolment Policy

What has not changed?

- Schools will continue to enrol students who live in their local intake area, regardless of the school's cap status.
- Enrolment procedures for students accessing particular education settings (for example selective schools, distance education, specialist support classes for students with disability, Intensive English Centres) are not affected by the revised policy.

Schools will continue to provide families with support and advice during the enrolment process, including assessment of exceptional and compelling circumstances particularly for vulnerable students and their families.

Schools will also continue to apply the policy fairly and consistently using transparent and accountable processes when making decisions about enrolment applications. Parents and carers have a right of appeal to determine whether the stated processes have been applied in a procedurally fair manner.

Sorting objects by colour, shape and size is an important part of early numeracy. The children also get the opportunity to get creative with the loose parts we put out for them to use to practice their skills.



AUSTRALIA'S BIGGEST MUSIC EDUCATION CELEBRATION.

Music: Count Us In (MCUI) is Australia's largest music program, supporting teachers from more than 3000 schools to deliver inventive, creative and enjoyable music lessons in the classroom.

Each year, MCUI brings more than half a million people together in song, with a Celebration Day that reaches into every corner of the country. From Bendigo to Bourke, Dubbo to Darwin, Halls Creek to Hobart, Port Augusta to Port Douglas, young people sing the song that stops the nation.

The song is written by student songwriters from across Australia, collaborating with MCUI's celebrity mentors. The song is then distributed to participating schools with weekly, classroom- ready education plans and resources to help teach the song to your students.

DWPS students K-6 have been part of this wonderful program now for four years and the children are looking forward to participating again. They have been learning the AUSLAN signing as well as the words to this years song called *We Are*.

Parents are welcome to come along to the school hall to hear the students sing as part of this National event where more than 700,000 children across Australia will sing the same song at the same time. The live broadcast begins at 12:00pm with the song to be sung following the countdown at exactly 12:30pm.



What's on at the **WPCC** in November 2019:

Art of Threatened Species.

Opening Nov 9th.

Art of Threatened Species explores threatened flora, fauna and the environments that sustain them in New South Wales, by enabling artists and scientists to collaborate. Each artist has travelled vast distances and spent many hours researching and observing species and environments. Each has partnered with a scientist working within each specific field. The resulting works will attempt to communicate the issues, politics, and emotions that surround at-risk animals, plants and environments. This project is a partnership between Orana Arts (OA) and the Office of Planning, Industry and Environment.



New Acquisitions: Joan Ross.

Joan Ross is one of Australia's leading contemporary Artists, whose practice explores Australian History, landscape, and the imagery and materials of Australian native fauna. This section of works recently donated to the WPCC by the artist, is a unique insight into her diverse practice and features video, sculpture and installation.

Play on: The Art of Sport.

Play On: The art of sport celebrates 10 years of the Basil Sellers Art Prize, the prestigious and distinctively Australian biennial exhibition that reflects upon one of our great national obsessions - sport. Featuring the winners and other key works from all five instalments of the Prize, Play On: The art of sport brings together diverse explorations of the personal and collective significance of sport and sporting culture from some of Australia's most accomplished artists. The exhibition encompasses a dynamic range of media, with works that respond to an equally extensive range of sporting genres, including community footy, women's boxing, ground-keeping, gymnastics and AFL.

Rochelle Summerfield: Crossroads.

Closing Dec 1st.

This Haunted House by Bega based artist Merryn Sommerville explores the internal oppression of being raised in the Christian religion, and the complexity of negotiating issues of social injustice and identity as a condemned agnostic. Sommerville's emotive drawings touch on issues of female autonomy, sexuality, disability, morality and mortality. She uses an unexpected psychological presence in her female subjects as a surrogate to explore her space within society. This exhibition will explore the shift in social identity as women reach the age of thirty and are expected to reproduce.

MAD MOSSY: Murder, Mayhem and the Forgotten Class. Closes Nov 24th. Albert Andrew Moss is almost lost to history, but 80 years ago his name was everywhere. Whispered in pubs, front parlours and corner stores, Dubbo was gripped by the story of 'Mossy' and his dramatic trial for the murder of three men. The trial was the most sensational of its day with claims that Moss had killed up to 13 men across NSW. It would place Dubbo at the centre of an explosive criminal tragedy. But was he guilty? Did he get a fair trial? And was the legal system of the day up to handling 'Mad Mossy'?


We also have our permanent collections on show in both the museum and art gallery spaces.
The museum collection has developed to reflect the many

different roles that Dubbo has played over its almost 170 year director roles that Dubbo has played over its almost 1/0 year history. From objects of agricultural or technological development, to those belonging to pioneers and entrepreneurs, and the **prized possessions** of people who were born and bred in Dubbo, raised families, ran businesses and became part of its ever developing fabric.





The prime collecting theme for our gallery is The Animal in Art. Inspired by the Gallery's rural location and proximity to Taronga Western Plains Zoo, the Animal in Art seeks to examine issues surrounding the representation of animals in the Visual Arts. The Animal has been used extensively as a symbol, trophy, object and metaphor. The collection tackles some of the wider possibilities of this rationale through works that use the animal as a means of expression whether in a literal or metaphoric way.


